

A glass ball makes an interesting photos. The ones here are from different perspectives and places. Not just landscapes and flower blooms, but objects too.



The glass ball sits on a stump in this photo. With a wooded area in the background, the view is interesting and spectacular.



A tulip Magnolia bloom creates an illusion resembling a hot air balloon. This early spring flower is often killed by frost before the blooms fall. Last year they were covered in a late season snow, but they were unhurt.

In a garage the glass ball sits on a rear wing giving an interesting effect to where the ball is attached. Using only natural light the colors did not need and photo alterations when processed. Imagination is the key to photos from a different perspective than the normal. Always look for what interests you when taking photos.





It is not often I see a cool car in a glass ball photo. I could not resist the opportunity to catch this Porsche. Why was it out of the garage with snow still on the ground? Many are of these cars are driven year round. Let's go for a ride! Look for opportunities to photograph things that you seldom see anywhere.

What would you do with a car like this? It can stay in the garage and admired, or driven like it was intended and get full enjoyment. Whatever the owner decides it is his choice, but if I paid that much for a car I would want to drive it often to get my money's worth. As a photographer, always look for what seems out of place. Chances are you will get an interesting shot other photographers never considered.



Snow is predicted so preparations must be made. These staples seem to fly off grocery store shelves every time snow is predicted. Since snow storms in this area seldom last more than three days it make one wonder what people are thinking.

This fungus made an interesting close-up pattern. While walking in wooded areas look for the small and interesting on the ground. Stop often and look around your feet and above your head. Good photos exist all around, not just in eye level vision. Look up, down, and all around.

Is it interesting, pretty, or just ordinary? As a photographer look for what looks interesting to you. It may not be publishing quality, but publishing should not always be your goal. Enjoying your photographs because you like them makes one smile and enjoy the memories. Go for the money shot when that is required, but at other times go for the simple pleasure of being a photographer.



I let my imagination run wild with this photo created in Adobe Photoshop CC. When being creative is constrained by conventional thought the result is often dull. Always encourage your wild side. Create the strange and unusual. You may be pleasantly surprised at the result.

What can you do to challenge your creativity? Challenge yourself to do something you have never done. Any unsatisfactory results can be deleted and a new idea started.


Toshiba PDR-M60 F 4.3 1/108 ISO 100 Fixed lens





Since I was shooting in a wooded area, shaded, I did not bring my flash with me. This photo opportunity was a surprise and I had enough time to only aim and shoot. Think of how much improved this photo could be if my flash had been available. This is a neighbor's dog so after the shot there was a time out from photography for petting and play.









